The schedule for High Holy Day services appears on the back of this letter, including Family Services on both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The Family Service is designed for children between the ages of 5 and 13, but older and younger children (accompanied by adults) are most welcome. **The morning service on both holidays will begin at 10:00 AM.** As noted in the schedule below, the Yom Kippur *Yiskor* service will follow the morning service. After *Yiskor*, we will continue with a brief Afternoon Service. Following the Afternoon Service, we will offer a break from services during which we will have an informal discussion on a topic as yet to be decided. To hear the shofar at the end of the holiday, please join us for the Concluding Service which will follow our Yom Kippur Family Service, as indicated in the schedule. The Concluding Service will be followed by our annual congregational Break Fast.

Enclosed is our 2010-2011 Calendar, listing a schedule of services and other programs. All our Friday night services begin at 7:30 PM. Our first Family Service will be a Sukkot Celebration on Friday, September 24<sup>th</sup>. We will hold a Shabbat dinner and service in and around the Temple Micah sukkah on the lawn in front of the manse, (the minister's home next to the church), (indoors if the weather is not good). We need help building the sukkah on Sunday afternoon, September 19<sup>th</sup>! If you would like to help, please contact Bob Mehlman at 609-921-1598. The whole congregation is invited to the Saturday morning services on the calendar. Please join us for Shabbat morning worship and to celebrate the B'nai Mitzvah of so many of our children.

## 2010 HIGH HOLY DAY SCHEDULE

In keeping with our founding principles, all Temple Micah services and other programs, including High Holy Day services, are open to the public, with no required tickets, so we encourage all non-members who attend to make as generous a contribution as possible.

Our Congregation continues to enjoy the benefits of meeting in the beautiful, historic Presbyterian Church of Lawrenceville on Main Street (Route 206) in the Village of Lawrenceville. Parking is available in the Church Parking lot, but PLEASE DO NOT PARK in any space that is marked "No Parking." You may also park on side streets off Route 206 and evenings in the retail store parking lots. Parking will also be available on Route 206 (Main Street) near the Church; check with our ushers when you arrive.

We invite everybody to celebrate the New Year at a festive *oneg* immediately following the Rosh Hashana evening service. On Yom Kippur, following the Concluding Service, please join us for our annual **congregational Break Fast**. The Break Fast is open to everyone, but you must make a reservation before the holiday by informing an usher or by calling Bob/Marion Pollack (609) 896-0025. There is a nominal \$10/per-person donation of all who attend.

Child Care is available at the church during the daytime Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur Services (September 9<sup>th</sup> and September 18<sup>th</sup>) for children up to age 5; cribs are available for infants. Child Care is free; but space is limited, so please call Faith Wight at (609) 890-7943, (evenings), so she can make the necessary arrangements. Children are welcome to attend regular services, as long as they do not bother other congregants. Of course, please bring all of your children to both Family Services.
